Greetings on behalf of The York County Alliance for Learning! Like many organizations across our region and beyond, the 2019-2020 school year presented us with unforeseen challenges, requiring quick adaptation to continue to provide services. Because of these challenges, YCAL is better prepared to address the uncertainty of the future with the readiness and resiliency to accept and embrace new methods and new technology.

YCAL works closely with our business partners to deliver programming, many of which were temporarily closed or working offsite. Simultaneously, our educators were now being asked to quickly and effectively adapt the delivery of their craft while their student shifted to a full, distance-learning model. From March 16th onward, because of these shifting priorities, YCAL was forced to cancel fifteen of our Career Exploration Programs, multiple Pre-Apprenticeship program sessions, Educator in the Workplace, and the annual School Directors Dinner.

As we forge ahead into the 2020-2021 school year, varying degrees of uncertainty still exist such as our Partner Schools' outside learning activity policies, state guidelines on group gatherings, as well as the willingness and ability of our business partners to safely allow students to visit their facilities. YCAL is preparing to work with all of our stakeholders to ensure that career exploration and development activities can occur safely and effectively next year. We have already begun to invest in technology that can be leveraged and integrated into our program delivery.

This year was on pace to be a year of tremendous growth in YCAL's student outreach. Despite challenges in the final months of the school year, YCAL programs impacted just under 8,400 students, which nearly matched our previous school year. YCAL continues to develop new programs and deepen connections with educators, and I cannot credit our Partner Schools enough for their amazing work connecting students to these opportunities.

FINANCIAL SUMMARY

YCAL partnered with over 150 businesses in 2019-2020 to connect schools and employers, helping to serve the needs of local education and to address the current and future needs of the local workforce. In many cases, organizations partner with YCAL and give of their time and resources to host students and educators through various programs. In other instances, businesses and individuals choose to donate to YCAL, knowing this investment will help the organization continue to offer services that will benefit our local school students and educators and serves as an investment in the future workforce.

K-12 Partnership Funding

Via an annual investment in YCAL, K-12 Partner Schools help to financially support the organization's mission and financial viability. Utilizing this investment, YCAL provides access to career exploration and development opportunities to students as well as enrichment opportunities for educators as discussed throughout the entire report. YCAL is grateful for the K-12 Partner Schools' continued recognition of the importance of this work, and the return on their investment in these services.



Grant Funding

YCAL seeks out funding opportunities made available through various local, regional, state, and federal programs. Utilizing these programs as well as local partnerships with similarly-aligned organizations provides a great deal of financial support, enabling the continuance, expansion, and addition of new programs. YCAL receives considerable support from the region's workforce investment board, South Central PA Works, through the Business and Education Partnership grant funding, as well as "PAsmart" collaborative grant partnerships with the Manufacturers' Association and Lincoln Intermediate Unit.

Event Sponsorships



In 2019-2020, YCAL partnered with 21 school systems to provide career education, exploration, and development resources and programs for educators and students in York County.

Partner Schools have representatives that attend YCAL meetings to help collaborate and speak on behalf of the educators and students of their schools. Financial support from these school systems provides YCAL with approximately one-third of its annual revenue.

ENGAGING STUDENTS: CAREER EXPLORATION PROGRAMS



























































In 2019-2020, YCAL collaborated with 28 business partners, offering nearly 40 unique Career Exploration Programs, spanning the 16 nationally-recognized career clusters. These programs continue provide an effective way for students to expand their awareness of the required education, training, skills, and character traits of various career paths that interest them. This awareness enables them to make more informed decisions about their career path as they approach the end of their high school careers. Despite the cancellation of 15 programs at the end of the school year due to school closures and mandated health quidelines, **over 750 students attended** these programs in 2019-2020! We look forward to offering these programs again in 2020-2021 with the offering additional of virtual programs to expand reach and accessibility.



ENGAGING STUDENTS: MANUFACTURING DAYS TOURS

The Manufacturing Days Tours program is a series of one-day events held in conjunction with National Manufacturing Day. Taking place the first Friday in October, National Manufacturing Day celebrates those who proudly stand behind our goods and services in America.

As part of YCAL's mission, partnerships are formed with various manufacturers to allow school group tours to be scheduled throughout the weeks surrounding National Manufacturing Day. This program exists to help foster the connection between industry and education, to realign many common misconceptions of the industry, and to promote the many career opportunities in manufacturing while celebrating the significant contributions York County makes on a global level. YCAL partners with The Manufacturers' Association who is instrumental in promoting the program to their members.

Between October 1st and 11th 2019, 16 manufacturers opened their doors for 200 students and their educators to help build awareness of the vast and diverse amount of career opportunities in this industry.

ENGAGING STUDENTS: CAREER READINESS EDUCATION WORKSHOP (CREW)









The Career Readiness Education Workshop (CREW) is a one-day event that exists to help students gain multiple career exploration experiences while making connections with various post-secondary education and employment representatives. This program is beneficial for students in their early high school careers as well as those who are close to graduation and attempting to finalize their career path.

On March 12, 2020, the Harrisburg Area Community College's York Campus once again opened their doors and allowed YCAL to take over their campus for the day, welcoming 220 students for a day of Career Education. Over 40 business partners helped support the event which included career cluster presenters, post-secondary expo participants, and the Essential Business Skills Seminar presenter Kristi Weierbach, Ph.D., of Stambaugh Ness.

The Essential Business Skills Seminar serves as the keynote address of this event, as it helps the student sharpen what is often referred to as "soft skills", but we refer to them as "essential skills as they can positively affect their employability. This year the program planning committee selected Kristi to speak to the students about finding and following their passions, whatever they may be, and using them effectively in their careers.

The format of the event has students attending their choice of three (of the 16) career cluster informational presentations delivered by a business or training partner associated with that industry. In the second half of the day, students are provided the opportunity to attend post-secondary and employment skills sessions that help students hone their professional skills as well as providing a venue to collect information and make connections with various employment and educational options.












ENGAGING STUDENTS: PRE-APPRENTICESHIP

Pre-Apprenticeship programs are a proven method that allow potential employees to explore a certain career path while developing skills. In addition, these programs are found to increase employee retention in the years following the conclusion of the Pre-Apprenticeship. Through partnerships with Kinsley Construction (Construction), York Electrician's York Electrical Institute (Electrical) and The Manufacturers' Association (Manufacturing) YCAL connected high school students with three excellent career education and development opportunities.

Pre-Apprenticeship sessions occur during the school day and require an enrolled student to be on-site at the Pre-Apprenticeship partner's location 6 or more sessions throughout the school year. In addition to specific skills related to this trade, students discuss job safety and employability skills, with an OSHA 10 Certification being provided in two of the programs.

In 2019-2020, a total of 60 students completed the Pre-Apprenticeship Programs. Due to mandated school closures some of the programs end dates were adjusted and students were provided with the option of completing their programs in the summer months. YCAL is excited to offer all three of these programs again in 2020-2021, with 50 applications already received prior to summer break beginning.







ENGAGING EDUCATORS: EDUCATOR IN THE WORKPLACE

Educator in the Workplace is a concept that continue to gain popularity across the state and our country. This program connects teachers with the business community, providing an opportunity for educators to develop an enhanced awareness and understanding of current work standards. Conversely, workplace hosts can gain a better understanding of the current opportunities and challenges that educators address in their instruction and student interaction.

The program is delivered through a mix of classroom activities and experiential learning on-site at their chosen workplace. Through the cohort structure, educators participating in this program have the opportunity to collaborate and share experiences with their peers.

Although YCAL has offered this program for many years, new funding sources have recently become available to help promote these efforts in various ways. Collaborating with the Lincoln Intermediate Unit and capitalizing on a grant made available through the PAsmart program, YCAL offered multiple cohorts throughout the school year. The Spring 2020 cohort was postponed until Fall 2020, where additional applications can be accepted. We are thankful for all of the business partners who were willing to serve as workplace host sites for our educators in search of gaining additional experience to bring back to their students!

ENGAGING EDUCATORS: INNOVATION GRANTS

Innovation Grants are mini grants of up to \$1,000 each, that allow YCAL the opportunity to fund innovative projects that align with YCAL's mission of connecting educators and employers to engage students in career exploration and development.

At the core of the grant guidelines is the partnership of a business or community organization to be involved at some stage of the completion of the grant. Its YCAL's hope that the project will continue on after the initial funding is granted to provide even further impact beyond year one.



In February 2020 YCAL was able to award 12 Innovation Grants totaling of \$10,217.18. These 12 projects carry an estimated impact on 2,146 students during the first year that the projects are launched. YCAL commends the efforts of those that applied for this program and we look forward to awarding these grants once again in 2021. Applications will be available at the start of the 2020-2021 School Year.

The Career Education and Work Standards Symposium is an event for York County educators, focused on the Career Education and Work Standards. This event encourages a spirit of collaboration, providing K-12 educators with four impactful, relevant lesson plans to adapt to the grade level in which they specialize.

YCAL held it's 10th Annual Symposium on February 27, 2020 with nearly 200 attendees at York County School of Technology. The event was copresented through a generous sponsorship by the Pennsylvania College of Health Sciences and Thaddeus Stevens College of Technology and featured a keynote address from Laura Fridirici, Career Readiness Advisor & Special Consultant to the Secretary for Career Readiness, at the Pennsylvania Department of Education.
